BOURNE REBORN

HE first Hackney school to be built in the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park – Mossbourne Riverside Academy – has celebrated its official opening.

The primary school is part of East Wick, one of five new communities created in the park. It is next to Here East – a hub for creative and technology industries – and looks over the River Lee Navigation.

Staff and pupils joined the Mayor of Hackney, Philip

Glanville; Deputy Mayor, Anntoinette Bramble; and representatives from the London Legacy Development Corporation to officially open the academy on 5 June.

Pupils have access to world class facilities including the London Aquatics Centre and Lee Valley Hockey and Tennis Centre. The academy, in East Bay Lane, has reception and key stage 1 classes, but plans to become a three form entry primary school.

It is currently accepting expressions of interest for its new nursery, due to open next September.

The Mayor said: "It's great to see another key part of the 2012 legacy come to fruition, and it was lovely to visit the school again for its official opening. Securing real benefits for local people was a crucial part of the 2012 Games for Hackney, so to see this amazing purpose built, state-of-the-art school open

right here in the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park is a very special moment."

Principal Amy Wood added: "Our academy shows every child that we hold teaching and learning with the highest regard, we understand pupils only have one chance at primary education, and we will ensure that it is the best."

Election results: MPs retain seats

HACKNEY's two MPs were re-elected with increased majorities, in the General Election on 8 June. In a 66.9 per cent turn out ,Diane Abbott received 42,265 votes (75 per cent) to hold the Hackney North and Stoke Newington seat for Labour. While Meg Hillier received 43,974



votes (79 per cent) to win the Hackney South and Shoreditch seat on a 66.4 per cent turn out. After the Hackney North result was announced, Ms Abbott said: "In Hackney the people have supported our campaign, which was a positive campaign addressing the issues that concern people, whether it's the state of our NHS, whether it's the housing crisis, whether it's benefit cuts. We fought a positive campaign here in Hackney and we have been vindicated.' Ms Hillier tweeted: "Thank you. I will continue to fight

for #Hackney, for those who have no voice and for our children's future."



The Hackney Pride 365 festival aims to celebrate that tolerance and diversity every single day of the year, remembering past, often hard-won victories, as well as celebrating the range of communities who live in our borough today."

Hackney will also take

part in the Pride in London parade on 8 July, with 150 people representing the borough.

Priority is the young

S Soraya Adejare begins her oneyear post as the new Speaker of Hackney, the Dalston ward councillor and mother-of-one's first priority is the borough's young people.

Her main objective is to use her new role to empower disadvantaged groups, especially young people who hold a special place in her heart.

While still at sixth form, she worked for Hackney Early Years, a charity that provided a broad range of educational services to schools in the borough.

The Speaker describes her time there as rewarding and valuable. She adds: "You see so many different things undertaking that kind of work; you see fairly affluent families, to the most deprived, and it just brings you a different level of understanding of wider society."

The Speaker's belief in young people also stems from her time working with various youth programmes, which taught her the importance of investing in young people and the difference one person can make.

She says: "Just being able to impart a small degree of knowledge to them, allows them to set targets for themselves to reach."

The Speaker also hopes to raise the profile of community groups and local businesses that operate within the borough during her time in office.

It is important for her to be able to engage with these groups of people in order to make them feel like the work they do is significant.

She says: "They may not be in the news all the time, but we want people to know that we as councillors appreciate the work they do."

As someone who was born in Glasgow, but raised in Woodberry Down estate, the Speaker feels it is vital that residents see the people that represent them.

This was one of the reasons for her initially becoming a councillor.

She says: "There is no culture or social group that's alien to me, and no part of Hackney that is unknown to me.

"Although there have been a lot of changes going on, it's a place that I value highly and I am proud to be a part of."

Becoming a mother has further inspired the Speaker to do more for Hackney's young people, and she regularly attends Council meetings with her three-year-old daughter, Nafeesah.

In her spare time, the Speaker also volunteers for

the homelessness charity Crisis, and is a Governor at Tyssen Primary School, in N16.

Her aim to raise the awareness of disadvantaged groups has certainly influenced the choice of charities that she will be supporting during her term as Speaker.

She has decided on three charities which focus on providing a nurturing environment for young people to grow up in.

They are: Skyway, which undertakes youth work in a variety of settings; Off Centre, which provides counselling, therapy, advocacy, advice and

psychosocial services for young people in Hackney; and The Access to Sports Project, a community-led, creative and innovative sports development charity project.

A new Speaker is elected every May at the Council's **Annual General Meeting** by fellow councillors.

Cllr Adejare will be supported this year by the Deputy Speaker, Cllr Clare Potter.

PILOT scheme to cut pollution and make it safer and easier for children to walk and cycle to school is due to start this month.

The road outside St John the Baptist Primary School, in Hoxton, is set to close to traffic in the mornings and afternoons from 26 June.

Crondall Street will be a pedestrian and cyclist only zone from 8.30am to 9.15am and 3.15pm to 4pm during term time.

The scheme was supported by the majority of parents and residents who responded to a recent public consultation.

People who live on the street will still be able to drive down the street if their vehicle is registered with the Council. To do so, e-mail: streetscene@ hackney.gov.uk

Non-registered vehicles entering the street during the scheme operation hours will be identified by camera and issued a fixed penalty notice.

Cllr Ferval Demirci. Cabinet Member for Neighbourhoods, Transport and Parks, said: "I'm delighted that the majority of parents and residents agree with our proposal to close Crondall Street during school pick up and drop off times.

"The vast majority of children in Hackney walk or cycle to school, but too many children still make the journey by car.

"Driving children to

school is bad for air quality and bad for children's health. I hope Crondall Street will be the first of many School Streets in the borough.

"It's just one of the things we're doing to try to make it safer and easier for children to walk and cycle to school."

As part of the scheme, the Council will be collecting data on how parents and pupils travel to school and taking air quality readings.

A second School Street scheme will be piloted in Oldhill Street, Stamford Hill, outside Tyssen Community School.

Parents and residents will be consulted on these plans over the summer, with road closures planned from September.

When the Council has evaluated the success of both pilots, it will decide whether to roll out the scheme to other schools in the borough, although not all will be suitable for it.

HILDREN say the most extraordinary things, but now tales dreamed up by local kids, are being turned into a series of picture books.

The imaginative works are the result of a collaboration between Penguin Random House UK and Hackney-based children's charity Ministry of Stories, which aims to help less advantaged children, aged eight to 18, realise their creative potential.

In fact, the authors of the 17 picture books are all under the age of 12.

At the charity's Hoxton headquarters, the children were encouraged to

compose stories that their younger selves would have enjoyed, aided by writing mentors.

Each young author then worked closely with a professional illustrator, sketching out ideas in order to help bring them to life.

Maise Noble, one of the illustrators who volunteered her time, said:

"Selin, the little girl I worked with, had heaps of energy

and our meetings were really fun.

"The writing mentors and myself encouraged her to have control over all aspects of the book.

"Selin mentioned to me that when she told people that she was having a book printed, they didn't believe her. She couldn't wait to show them the finished thing."

The books include stories about two toucans who travel to England in search of jobs; a boy with magical football boots; and a child who wants to go to the moon, but is too small.

Fifty sets of the books have also been printed and given to all those involved in the project, as well as to local schools and Shoreditch Library.

Melinda, nine, the author of 'Tecnoglo and the Special Element', said: "It feels amazing to have something published for real and it's really good that children might be reading my book as a bedtime story."

Help for young care leavers

A NEW website to help care leavers make informed decisions about education and work was launched by the Learning and Work Institute last month.

Supported by the Department for Education and Skills, the website aims to help young people who have left, or are in the process of leaving, the care system to think about the different learning, training and employment routes available to them, and find out what support they can receive along the way.

Nicola Aylward, Head of Learning for Young People at the Learning and Work Institute, said: "Many young people leaving care face serious disadvantage.

"Frequent moves, instability and lack of positive role models can prevent young people in care from developing skills that are important in their transition to adulthood, independent living and further education and work opportunities."

Recipes for success

SOCIAL enterprise in Hackney that makes affordable healthy recipe kits for residents has just been launched.

Produced by Haggerston-based Make Kit, they contain everything needed to create a nutritious meal at home, including pre-measured ingredients and an easy-to-follow recipe.

Last year, the kits were piloted over a three-month period on Fellows Court Estate, E2.

Seimone, a local resident who uses the kits, said:

It's saved me a lot of time with the kids. All the ingredients are there for you instead of you going to the shops

A family Make Kit starts at £2.64 per person and can be ordered online for two or four people.

They can be delivered to the door or collected from

a local pick-up point.

Make Kit was founded by chef Steve Wilson and businesswoman Justine Fish.

She said: "Meal kits are a new way of cooking at home and can help you eat healthier and save time and money.

"However, most recipe

kits are out of budget for the average UK household.

"We wanted to create a recipe kit that was affordable and bring these benefits to more people."



There are many different varieties of sweet potato and they have different qualities when cooked. For this recipe you will need sweet potatoes with orange flesh, which have a soft texture when cooked.

Orange sweet potatoes release their energy slower than white potatoes and are a good source of dietary fibre. This means they will keep you feeling fuller for longer than other more starchy potatoes. They are also a good source of carotenes, and vitamins C and B6.

Sweet potato falafel

Makes approx 20 falafel

Preparation time 25 mins



Cooking time 15-20 mins

Ingredients

- 300g orange sweet potato
- 1 small onion (finely chopped)
- 2 tsp ground cumin
- 2 cloves garlic (finely chopped)
- 2 tsp ground coriander
- ½ tsp black pepper
- 1 bunch parsley leaves (chopped)
- 2 tbsp lemon juice
- 2 tins chickpeas (rinsed, drained)
- 2-4 tbsp flour to thicken the mix
- Olive oil

For the sesame coating:

- 4 tbsp toasted sesame seeds
- Pinch black pepper

Method

- Preheat the oven to 220C/200C fan/gas 7
- Peel sweet potato and chop into roughly 2cm chunks. Boil in water for 10mins. Remove and strain while still firm, it should still be a little bit difficult to poke with a knife
- Meanwhile, blend or mash the chickpeas into a rough paste with the chopped garlic. Combine with the sweet potato, onion, cumin, black pepper, garlic, parsley, ground coriander and lemon juice and mix well. You should be able to roll the mixture into patties. If it is too sticky, stir in some wholemeal or flour
- Mix the black pepper and sesame seeds and tip onto a plate
- Roll the falafel mixture into small patties and coat with the sesame seeds
- Place on a lightly oiled baking tray and bake for 15-20 minutes until golden brown
- Serve and enjoy.

Have your say on home proposals for regeneration programme

COMMUNITIES across Hackney have been helping shape the design of some of the thousands of new homes - being built as part of the Council's regeneration programme – through a series of interactive engagement events.

The designs replace previous plans and increase the number of Council homes on the site, with over half now being for social rent and low-cost homeownership.

programme: an initiative to build close to 400 homes on under-used Council land such as garages, car parks and depots, about 70 per cent of which will be for social rent and shared ownership.
